



## **SEA SERPENTS AND MONSTERS!**




## PIRATE'S SHOELACE KNOT


It's three times stronger than a regular shoelace knot!




Tie a Left-over-Right Starting Knot as shown, then make both laces into "loops" by simply doubling them back onto themselves. People often refer to these as "Bunny Ears".



Cross the two loops over each other so that the right (gray) loop ends up in front and the left (white) loop ends up behind. The white loop is now the right loop.




Begin to wrap the right (white) loop around the left (gray) loop to end up in front.



At the same time, begin to wrap the left (gray) loop around the back. You will end up with the ends of both loops on opposite sides of the "hole" in the middle.



Feed both ends of the loops through the hole in the middle. The right (white) loop goes out the back and the left (gray) loop comes out the front





Now, simply pull the loops to tighten the knot. The whole twisted mess of the previous drawing will rearrange itself into a neat finished knot. Trust me, it works!




The finished knot should be a tight, closed knot with a symmetrical, double wrap around the middle, as compared to the single wrap of any Standard Shoelace Knot.

Trace this pattern onto some old fabric (an old t-shirt, or wash cloth) and cut it out with a scissors. Make sure to make little cuts on the four little marks. Then take a shoestring or a piece of twine and tie it to one of the slits. Run the string in back of your head and measure how long it needs to be. Then tie it to the other slit! You're good to go pillage the high seas!
